Time for a **run**.

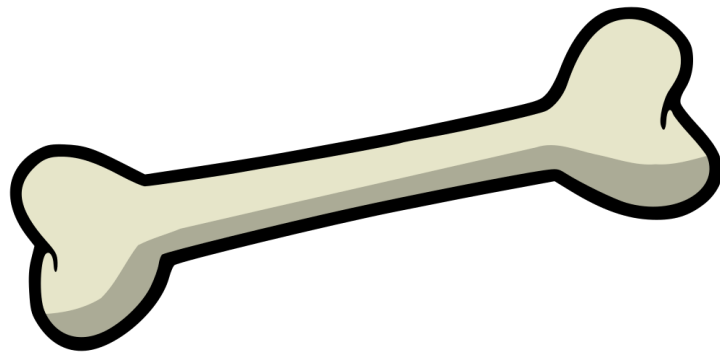
The children got up early and got ready for their **run**. They went on a **run** every day as they wanted to keep healthy. “I can’t wait to go on our **run** today,” said the boy.



It was a lovely day outside and the **sun** was shining. “I love running in the **sun**,” said the boy.



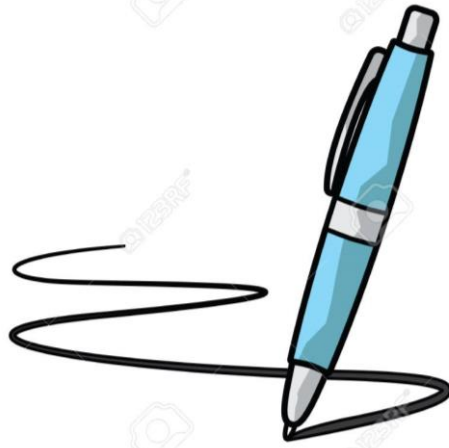
The children started running. They had been running for a while but then, the boy fell over a **bone**. “Ouch! Why is there a **bone** in the middle of the road?” he said.



“I’ve hurt my **chin!**” said the boy. The girl had a look but there weren’t any marks on his **chin** so they kept running.



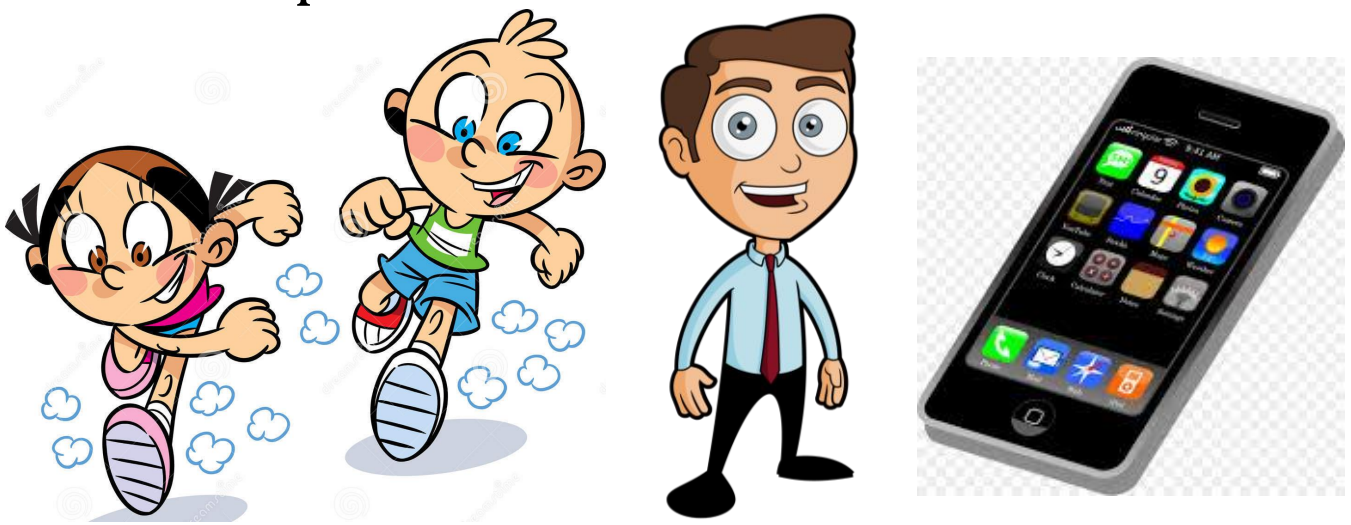
After a few minutes, the girl fell over.

middle of the road!” she said.



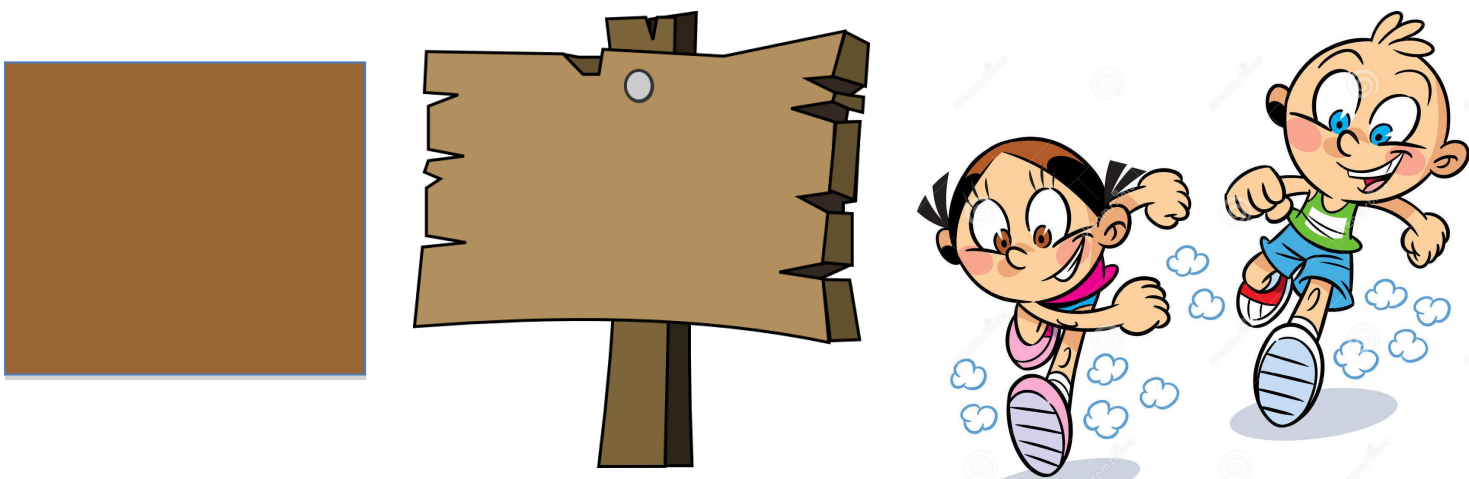
“Now I’ve hurt my **chin** too!” she said.
