

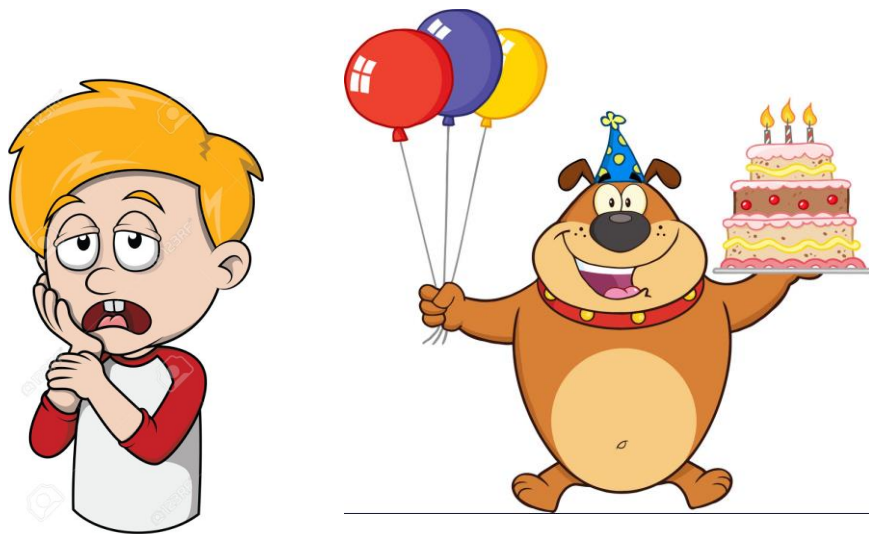


The boy with the toothache.

He was having a birthday party that night so he needed his toothache to have gone by then.



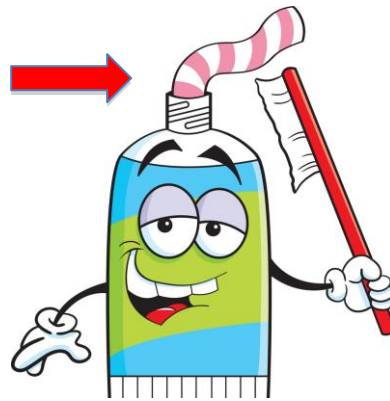
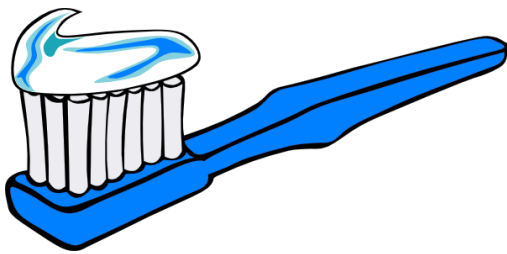
The boy went in to the **bathroom** and looked for something to help him with his **toothache**. He looked in the **bathroom** cupboard.



As he opened the **bathroom** cupboard, everything fell out on to the **bath mat**. “Oh no!” said the boy and he had to put everything back in.



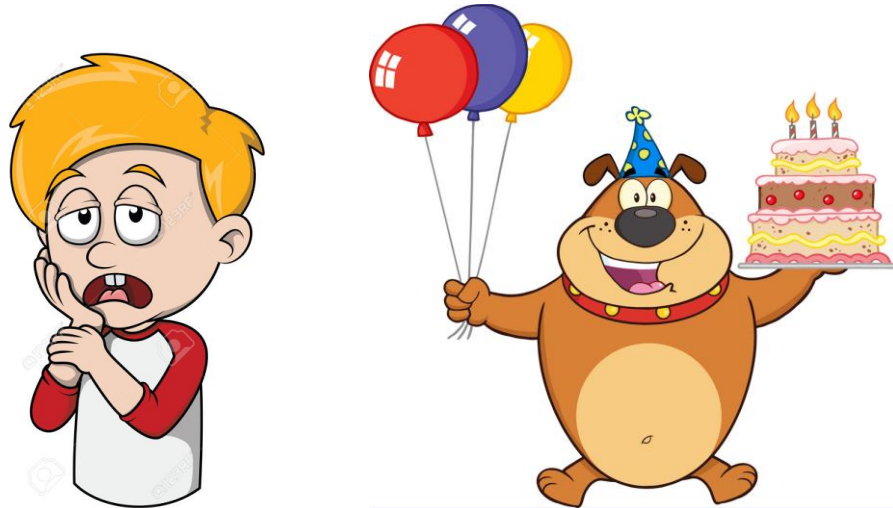

Then, he used some **mouthwash** but he still had **toothache**.



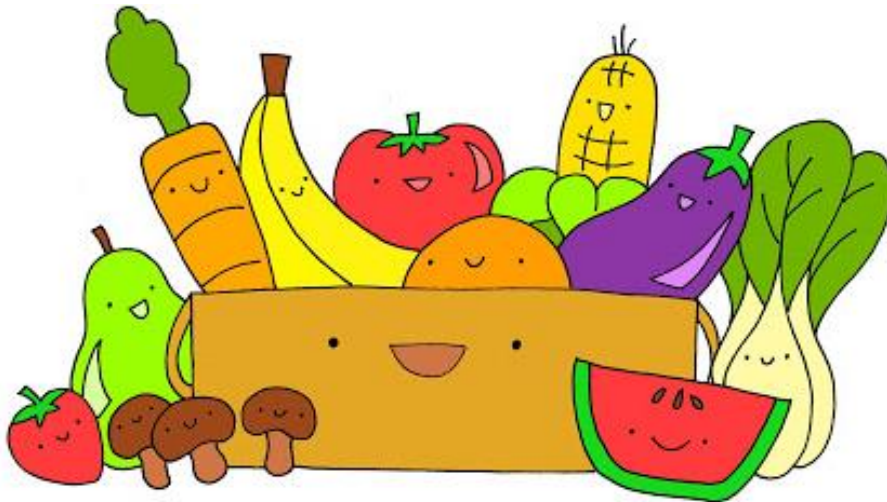
Then, the boy went down stairs and opened his **birthday** presents. He had so many **birthday** presents that he was opening them for a long time.
